

LOCATION OF CEMETERY

Haute-Avesnes is a village 9 kilometres west of Arras on the south side of the Arras-St Pol road. The British Cemetery is north of the village on the road (C2) leading to Habarcq.

HISTORY INFORMATION

The 51st (Highland) Division started the cemetery in July 1916 and it continued to be used by field ambulances of the divisions holding this part of the line. The cemetery contains 142 Commonwealth burials of the First World War and eight German war graves. The cemetery was designed by A J S Hutton.

Founded over a century ago to commemorate the First World War dead of the British Empire, from the outset the Imperial War Grave Commission's work was defined by the principle of equality of treatment in death. Whatever an individual's rank in social or military life, whatever their religion, they would be commemorated identically – with their name engraved either on a headstone over an identified grave or on a memorial to the missing.



S/17403 PRIVATE ALBERT ERNEST SMITH'S GENEALOGY DETAILS

In the 1851 census for Osgathorpe there are no Smiths' recorded.

By 1861 John and Caroline Smith are recorded as being married and living in Osgathorpe. John is given as aged 31 and a Framework Knitter, born in Whitwick. His wife Caroline is 33 and a seamstress born in Thringstone. They have four children, Charles (7), Mary Ann (5), Adeline (3) and George Thomas (1).

In 1871 John and Caroline only have Charles, Adeline and George Thomas living with them, so Mary Ann, is presumed to be away from home perhaps working as a servant, or she could have died even.

In the 1881 census John and Caroline are living at home and still working as a Frame Work Knitter and Seamstress respectively.

The 1881 census records that Charles Smith (son of John and Caroline), aged 27 is now married to Martha, aged 38, who was born in Blackfordby. They have a son Albert aged 5 months, who is the subject of this publication. Little did his father and mother realise what their 5 month old son was going to be faced in his future life when he gave the ultimate sacrifice in fighting overseas for his country.

In the 1891 census Caroline Smith is a widow and post mistress, presumably at Osgathorpe Post Office.

In the 1891 census, Charles, Martha and their son Albert E are still in Osgathorpe but Charles is now a coal mine labourer.

In 1901, Caroline Smith, aged 73, is still post mistress at the Post Office but she has a grandaughter Adeline, aged 14 living with her. There are now no other Smith's recorded living in Osgathorpe, however, Charles and Martha are recorded in the 1911 census so they must have been away when the 1891 census was taken. They had two boarders living with them in 1911, who are given as Limestone Quarry labourers - Thomas Rudkin and George Wilson.

Albert Ernest Smith possibly got married before he enlisted, as what is assumed to be his wife Mrs Janet Smith of Osgathorpe, Loughborough is recorded on his grave records on page 9, but on the index sheet on page 10 only his mother and father, Charles and Martha are recorded. This requires further investigation as Janet Smith is also not mentioned on the CWGC certificate information on page 3, but his mother and father Charles and Martha are.

The family lived on Village Street, Osgathorpe.

Albert Ernest Smith was a churchwarden at St. Mary's Church, Osgathorpe, Leics

THE GORDON HIGHLANDER'S CAP BADGE

The regiment was formed on 1 July 1881 instigated under the Childers Reforms as the county regiment of: Aberdeenshire, Banffshire, and Shetland. Although the regiment was formed by two regular regiments, it in-fact controlled other units which were of the former Militia and Volunteer Force.

The regiment also raised 21 Reserve, Territorial, Garrison and New Army battalions during the war. These served on home stations, in France and Flanders, and in India.

The 1st Battalion was in England on the outbreak of the First World War (1914-18). It deployed immediately to the Western Front, where it stayed throughout the conflict. The 2nd Battalion arrived there in October 1914, staying until November 1917, when it moved to the Italian front.

The sheer scale of the conflict in the Great War, and the enormous demand for men, transformed the Gordon Highlanders. Some 50,000 Gordons served in its regular, territorial and service battalions. Between 1914 and 1918, the Regiment kept 9 Battalions on the Western Front. By the end of the war they had been awarded 65 new Battle Honours and suffered over 29,000 casualties, 9,000 of whom died. Almost every community and family in the North East, and many elsewhere, were affected.

ARRAS. 1917

From 9 April to 16 May, Allied troops attacked trenches held to the east of the French city of Arras. The ground and date were chosen for the battle as part of a combined operation with the French and included Vimy Ridge as a major objective. There were big gains on the first day, followed by stalemate and a series of small-scale operations to consolidate positions. These battles were largely successful in achieving their limited aims, but were gained at the price of a comparatively large numbers of casualties.

S/17043 Private Albert E Smith is recorded as dying from wounds.


