

PREFACE

This publication about one of the many King families that resided in Osgathorpe during the 1800's has been researched and written by the author to further add to our social and industrial history of this once ancient working village of Osgathorpe in NW Leicestershire.

Below is an extract from the 1861 Osgathorpe census showing 4 King families who were virtually living next door to each other including Thomas and Elizabeth King and their 7 children who are the main subject of this publication. There were a further 2 King families living in Osgathorpe in another location at this time. All these families would have been relatively poor, and life would have been really hard in those times. It is difficult to establish where these 4 families lived in Osgathorpe but interpreting the direction of the census enumerator's walk, it suggests that they would have lived in cottages in the area almost opposite the Storey Arms.

It is hoped that this publication will also assist genealogists researching this particular King family history

According to the Osgathorpe Parish Registers and Bishop's Transcripts, Thomas King, a son of John and Mary King, was baptised at St. Mary's Church, Osgathorpe on the 12th May 1822. He married Elizabeth Harrison (of full age) on the 23rd November 1846 at St. Mary's Church by Banns License. In the marriage records, Thomas King is recorded as being a labourer (Agricultural most likely) and Elizabeth as being a servant. Thomas's father John is given as being a labourer and Elizabeth's father John Harrison, a labourer also.

A John King (labourer) of Osgathorpe married Mary Newton of Belton at St. Mary's church, Osgathorpe by Banns on the 11th October 1819. John King is identified in the 1851 census as being born in Tonge and Mary in Blackfordby. This is thought to be the mother and father of Thomas King above. There is a record in the registers for a John King being baptised at St. Mary's on the 6th August 1797 and this is almost certainly Thomas King's father, although there is a conflict with the census regarding age, which needs further investigation.

This John King was registered in the baptism records as being the son of Thomas and Sarah King, and there is a record in the parish marriage records for a Thomas King of Whitwick marrying a Sarah Brown of Osgathorpe parish at St. Mary's church by Banns License on 7th December 1781, indicating that they were most likely the grandfather and grandmother of Thomas King

OSGATHORPE CENSUS RECORDS

1841 CENSUS

The **1841 census** below records what is thought to be Thomas King's mother and father John and Mary living in Osgathorpe with two daughters Elizabeth and Sarah aged 20 and 10 respectively. There is no mention of Thomas King.

1851 CENSUS

If we now move forward to the Osgathorpe **1851 census**, this confirms Thomas and Elizabeth King are married and living in Osgathorpe. By this time they have a son William aged 3, a daughter Eliza aged 2 and a daughter Ann aged 9 months. The census records Elizabeth as being born in Newton, Leics, and Thomas's employment as a common carrier.

Thomas's mother and father John King, an Ag Lab, born in Tonge, and Mary King (nee. Newton), born in Blackfordby and is a lace runner working from home, have a granddaughter Sarah Black aged 6 living with them.

1861 CENSUS

By the **1861 census**, Thomas and Elizabeth's daughter Eliza is missing, presumably she had died, but they have five more children making a total of seven living. However, Elizabeth is now recorded as being born in Horton instead of Newton as shown in the previous census. Interestingly, Thomas is recorded as being a 'Gammon Curer' although we know from Trade Directory records he is listed as a carrier.

Thomas's mother and father, John and Mary, are living alone.

1871 CENSUS

By 1871, Thomas is still being recorded as a carrier. He and Elizabeth have 3 children at home, Thomas aged 16 who is recorded as a carriers son, Elizabeth aged 13 a scholar, and a new daughter Selina aged 6, a scholar. This makes a total of nine children born to Thomas and Elizabeth.

John and Mary King are still living on their own, but Mary King is now recorded as being born in Ashby and her husband John in Breedon.

1881 CENSUS

The 1881 census records Thomas King as a carrier still and living with Elizabeth on their own. However, the burial records for the parish of Osgathorpe record that Elizabeth King was buried in St. Mary's church graveyard on October 24th 1884 aged 63

John and Mary King do not appear in the 1881 census as John died on the 18th of February 1875, recorded as being aged 82. It is thought that Mary died in the Union Workhouse, Ashby de la Zouch and was buried in St. Mary's graveyard on the 6th of June 1889. Due to inconsistencies in recorded ages for John and Mary in the various censuses, certain educated assumptions have been made.

1891 CENSUS

Following the death of his wife Elizabeth, Thomas was remarried to Hannah Harrison who was born in Norton Juxta (Twycross?) and is recorded in the 1891 census as a grazier. Thomas died on 11 January 1893 in Osgathorpe.

RELEVANT TRADE DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Melville & Co Directory & Gazetteer of Leicestershire 1851 records Thomas as being a 'Carrier' so he had achieved some status in the village.

The Post Office Directory of Leics & Rutland 1855 also records Thomas as a carrier.

In the Commercial Directory of Leics 1861, 'King & Varnam' are recorded as carriers to Ashby de la Zouch and Loughborough.

In the History, Gazetteer and Directory of Leics & Rutland 1863, Thomas King / John Billing are recorded as carriers to Loughborough and Ashby (Thursdays and Saturdays).

In Harrod & Cos. Directory for Leics & Derbys 1870, Thomas King does not feature.

In the Post Office Directory for Leics & Rutland 1876, Thomas reappears as a 'Carrier'.

He does not feature in further Trade Directories.

NEWSPAPER ARTICLES

The Kings' of Osgathorpe regularly appeared in local newspapers for committing minor public offences. The author has decided not to include these here as it is difficult to attach these to the various individuals with any certainty. However, the reader can download the authors publication entitled 'Asgotporp to Osgathorpe' on his website **samueltstewart.com** and go to the newspaper section where these feature.

EXAMPLES

Derby Mercury – August 16th 1882

Thomas King was charged with stealing £32. 7s. in money and a watch chain, valued £8., the property of Thos Johnson, at Belton, on the 7th inst.- Mr. Deane appeared for the prosecutor, who is a farmer at Osgathorpe, and stated that he had sold a horse on Monday and took the

money with him to Belton, where he saw the prisoner at a public-house. At night, the prosecutor and prisoner proceeded home to Osgathorpe, and when they got part of the way they sat down by the side of a ditch, and the witness fell asleep. When he awoke he missed his property, and the prisoner was gone. - **Remanded for seven days**.

Ashby de la Zouch Gazette – August 22nd 1885

ASHBY PETTY SESSIONS. SATURDAY, AUG. 15 - "Before Major Mowbray, A. E. Smith, Esq., and the Rev. W. B. Beaumont.

Thomas King, carrier, and Eliza Hinds, wife of George Hinds, labourer, both of Osgathorpe, were charged with having assaulted Mary Ann King, at Osgathorpe, on the 29th July. From the evidence, it appeared that on the day in question Thos. King assaulted the complainant, his wife, and on her leaving home to go down to her mother's, Mrs. Hinds met her and said, "now I will finish what he began," and she caught complainant by the hair of her head and struck her in the face several times.—King pleaded guilty, and several witnesses were called to prove the assault by Mrs. Hinds. Mr. Musson appeared for Mrs. Hinds.—Fined 10s. 6d. each and costs, or 14 days' hard labour.
