Sadly, Charles Percy Topham's adoptive mother, Helen "Nellie" Tophan (nee. Riley) who was born in 1893, died on the 11th of November 1927 aged 33 / 34. She is buried in St. Johns Mortuary Chapel graveyard, Coleorton Strangely there is no mention of her husband, Charles Frederick Topham on her gravestone. As they adopted Charles Percy (born in Whitwick) as a baby, Nellie would have died c.5 years following his adoption.

COMMENTS

Although we know that Pte Charles Percy Topham was serving with the "Pioneer Corps" when he was killed. We don't know where he enlisted or how or where his death occurred. Research is ongoing to try and establish this.

The tasks of the Pioneer Corps were varied but often involved manual labour. Many units found themselves stationed at ports, railheads and bases to help load or unload supplies. Work was also carried out on the construction and repair of roads and railways, often with the Royal Engineers. The **Royal Pioneer Corps** was formed in 1939, and amalgamated into the Royal Logistic Corps in 1993. Pioneer units also performed a wide variety of tasks in all theatres of war, including full infantry, mine clearance, guarding bases, laying prefabricated track on beaches, and effecting various logistical operations. With the Royal Engineers they constructed airfields and roads and erected bridges.

In September 1939, a number of infantry and cavalry reservists were formed into Works Labour Companies, which were soon made the **Auxiliary Military Pioneer Corps** (AMPC); a Labour Directorate was created to control all labour force matters. A large number of Pioneers served in France with the British Expeditionary Force

From its inception, this was ranked as a combatant unit - a status no previous pioneer unit had achieved. In June 1940, many of the AMPC's companies had to be pressed into use as combat troops during the Battle of France (1940), before being evacuated.

In November 1940, the unit was renamed the Pioneer Corps. Its recruits included Jewish and anti-Nazi refugees who had fled from Austria, Germany and Eastern Europe.

The author leans towards the view that the Pioneer Corps were in France making preparations for the D Day landings and this is when Pte Charles Percy Topham was killed.

COMMENTS

Although Charles Frederick and Helen Topham are credited on records as being from Coleorton on Charles Percy Tophams death records (1943), Helen had died in 1934 and no information as to where either Helen or her surviving husband Charles Frederick were living in Coleorton at any time has been found, and no Topham's are recorded in the 1939 register.


In the 1921 census, Helen and Charles Frederick were recorded as living at 167 Loughton Road in Whitwick with their adopted son Charles Percy Topham (under 1 month of age) and Helen Topham's mother Annie (aged 50 & born in Moston, Lancs) who was a retired matron at Ashby Workhouse.

In 1921, Charles Frederick was employed as an engineering fitter at Stableford's Waggon works in Coalville

It can be assumed that they must have moved to Coleorton before 1934 as Helen is buried in St. John's cemetery as shown in the preceding photographs.

THE 15TH SHERWOOD FORESTERS

The 15th (Nottingham) Battalion, Sherwood Foresters (Nottingham and Derbyshire Regiment) was raised at Nottingham in February 1915, by the Mayor and a committee, as a Bantam Battalion, from troops who were under the normal regulation minimum height of 5 feet 3 inches. Following initial training close to home, they joined the 105th Brigade in the 35th division at Masham, North Yorkshire in June 1915. The Division moved to Salisbury Plain for final training in August 1915. They were ordered to Egypt in late 1915, but the order was soon cancelled and they proceeded to France on the 1st of February 1916, and the division concentrated east of St. Omer. They were in action during the battles of the Somme at Bazentin Ridge, Arrow Head Copse, Maltz Horn Farm and Falfemont Farm. The division receivednew drafts of men to replace the horrendous losses suffered on the Somme.

BIOGRAPHY OF PERCY RILEY

Percy Riley was born at Mosten in Lancashire in 1895. He was the only son of Joseph and Anne Riley. In 1901, the family were living in Burnley at 3, Lancaster Street and Joseph was employed as a courthouse clerk. Anne worked as a woollen stocking knitter. By 1911, Joseph Riley was master of Ashby Workhouse which was located on Nottingham Road. Joseph's wife was the matron. **This was what obviously brought their daughter Helen (Nellie) Riley who married Charles Frederick Topham to Whitwick / Coleorton**. Apparently Percy Riley, before enlisting with the 15th Sherwood Foresters was also engaged in Poor Law Work, having successfully held the positions of master clerk at Hinckley, Kettering and Basford.

PERCY RILEY'S MILITARY SERVICE

In February 1915, Percy Riley enlisted in Nottingham with the 15th Sherwood Foresters, one of the many Kitchener Battalions. He was posted to France in January 1916. In a short while and at a young age he had risen to the rank of sergeant. In July 1916 the 15th Sherwoods' were involved in the Somme battles and on July 16th they relieved the 6th Northamptons' in the trenches south east of Trones Wood. Thiss one of the many wooded areas (see above) which were to become notorious for the ferocity of the fighting required to capture and hold them. Percy Riley was killed instantly whilst attacking German lines near Trones Wood on July 17th 1916. He was 21 years of age and as shown on the previous page he is buried at Guillemont Road Cemetery on the Somme, location, VII. 1. 4.

FAMILY LETTER

In a letter to his mother (Annie Riley) confirming his death 2nd Lt. N. H. Beedham wrote - "He was killed instantaneously whilst attacking German lines and was buried near the spot where he fell. Perhaps it will be of some little consolation for you to know that your son was a fine soldier, possessing a high level of duty and was greatly esteemed by all the Regiment who knew him. He met his end nobly and bravely facing the "Hun, even in death". In further testimony of high esteem in which Sgt. Riley was held, Lieutenant Hodgkinson wrote "in the death of your son, the company has lost one of the best Sergeants. For a long time, he was employed on special work at Army Corps Headquarters".

ASHBY BOARD OF GUARDIANS

DEATH OF SERGEANT P. RILEY

Mr Parker said they could not separate without expressing their deepest sympathy with the master and matron (Mr & Mrs. Riley) in the loss they had sustained by the death of their only son, Sergeant P. Riley, who had been killed in action. They were all very grieved when they heard the sad news, though it was only a repetition of what was happening in many homes at the present time. Here was a bright young man with every prospect before him who volunteered to serve his King and country, and had laid down his life in the noble cause he went out to uphold. He moved a vote of sympathy with the parents in their sad loss.

The chairman, supporting it, said he felt that he could never say enough in these circumstances. It was an awful thing when a father lost a promising son, especially in a war created through malice and enmity. These young fellows, from patriotic feelings, felt that they must go and fight for their country, and it was very sad when they were cut off. It would be a great grief to the master and matron, but it was one of those things which no one could help them to bear. They had to bear it themselves, and he hoped the matron, especially, would be given strength to bear it. (Hear, hear).

The resolution was also supported by the Rev. C. T. Moore, Mr Fowler and Mr Andrews, and was carried in silence by the members rising from their seats.

ASHBY WORKHOUSE MASTER'S SON KILLED

On Thursday morning last week, Mr and Mrs Riley, master and matron at the Ashby Workhouse, were officially notified that their son, Sergt. Percy Riley, had been killed in action on July 17th. Sergt. Riley was in the Notts and Derby Regiment. Before the war he was master's clerk at Basford Union and had held similar posts at Kettering and Hinckley. He was a promising young man and the only son of his parents, for whom much sympathy is felt. Reference was made to the sad event at the Ashby Guardians meeting on Saturday.
