PRE-AMBLE

It may surprise some to know that the close communities of Coleorton, Pegg's Green and Griffydam all sported amateur football teams, that were founded in the last quarter of the 19th century. A number of talented footballers emerged from local villages teams. For example, Joe Bradford from the Bradford footballing family of Pegg's Green went on to play for Birmingham and England. George Haywood who was born in Gelsmoor and later lived at the Outwoods', Coleorton (both in Worthington parish) who started his playing career with the "Coleorton Bible Class" team in the Coalville Sunday School league, went on to play with several top class teams including Birmingham City. More about George Haywood later in this publication.

Without having the facility to research old newspaper reports, virtually no information would have been available about these old teams. These reports have been transcribed from page 6 onwards for the benefit of the readers.

Most early local football teams were based at Public Houses and these played an important roll in the fabric of social life at that time. This applied in Coleorton where the old pre-war teams, to which this publication is dedicated, played out of the "Beaumont Arms", (apart from the Bible Class Team it is assumed). When one reads some of the following reports it becomes immediately evident that following the home matches, entertainment was carried on at the Beaumont Arms where a great many pitchers of beer would have been consumed, no doubt. There is one example where a team from Derby didn't leave the Beaumont Arms till 8.30p.m. in 1881 to make there way home, no doubt imbibing at other public houses on the way. Presumably they would have travelled by pony and trap or horse draw carriages / charabancs in these earlier days.

The earliest reference found to a Coleorton Football team is 1879 and a reserve team playing in that year is also recorded They were listed under various names including, "Coleorton United", "Coleorton Beaumont", Beaumont Club, "The Albion" & "The Wanderers". These different names make it difficult to provided continuity in the story, and further investigation is required.

By 1905, it is recorded that a Coleorton United team were playing in the "Coalville District Amateur Football League" along with Pegg's Green Victoria who they played against. In 1906, they were referred to as Coleorton Rising Star when admitted to the "Leicestershire Football Association". In 1924, an old photograph, included later, confirms that a Bible Class team were playing in the Sunday School League (Coalville & District) with whom George Haywood started his footballing career from 1924 to 1927. In 1929, Coleorton School also had a fine team, winning several trophies. Further reference to their successes appear later in the publication.

It is worth mentioning that Coleorton's Beaumont Cricket Club had been formed much earlier than the football team and the earliest record the author found was in 1852 when the married played the singles of Coleorton. They too played out of the Beaumont Arms and quite a lot of information has been found on them which is included in the author's history of the Beaumont Arms. There is some evidence that they shared the same the same playing field also. No reliable evidence has been found as to where the Coleorton Cricket and football pitches were located, but the author leans towards the view that they would have been in the fields opposite the Beaumont Arms.



The first records referring to the Beaumont Arms found by the author was in 1806. It is not known when the Beaumont Arms finally closed its doors as a public house, but it and it's land was sold to Marston Thompson & Evershed on the 8th of June 1940. Sir George Arthur Hamilton Beaumont Bart had died on the 2nd of October 1933. In his will dated the 21st of November 1931, he appointed Renee Muriel Bell, Isobel Frances Newton, and Henry Lushington Bolton as executors and they acted as his personal representatives / vendors at the sale.

John (Jackie) Redburn moved to the Beaumont Arms on Feb 2nd 1948 and it eventually became a family farm. They were there in 1992 when the layout of the cross-roads was changed. Sadly, modern houses now stand in this hallowed place

TRANSCRIBED NEWSPAPER REPORTS IN CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER

These three newspaper articles are the earliest reference found to a football team in Coleorton. Note the reference in the first one made to the game being played on the Cricket Ground.

Leicester Daily Mercury - Saturday 01 November 1879

COLEORTON.

A Football Match was played on the Cricket Ground Saturday, between the Coleorton and Swannington Football Clubs. Each side at the end of the game had scored a gaol.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 22 November 1879

FOOTBALL - **COLEORTON v CASTLE GRESLEY** - These clubs met at the Beaumont arms on Saturday. Some good play was witnessed for the first half, Coleorton getting the first goal, after which darkness set in, and the Gresley team being the stronger of the two, the obtained two goals in the dark. **The players afterwards enjoyed a convivial evening together** (**This would have been at the Beaumont Arms**).

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 13 December 1879

COLEORTON. FOOTBALL MATCH CASTLE GRESLEY v COLEORTON. — This match was played on Saturday last, and resulted in favour of Gresley by one goal to nothing, kicked by T. Langford.

Leicester Daily Mercury - Friday 03 December 1880

COLEORTON - A Football match was played on the Coleorton ground between Coleorton FBC and Whitwick FBC (Charnwood) ending in an easy victory for the home team by four goals to none. On the part of Coleorton, S. Robinson played exceedingly well obtaining two goals. J Fowkes also made a grand kick: getting a goal from a kick right from the centre of play. M Ball kicked well, and also obtained a goal. Whitwick appeared to have no chance whatever with their opponents. **After the play both teams adjourned to the Beaumont Arms Inn and passed an enjoyable evening.**

Leicester Chronicle - Saturday 11 December 1880

COLEORTON

Football.— Coleoton v Ravenstone — A fast and exciting game was played at Coleorton on Saturday. The home team won the toss, and elected to send in the visitors. Play commenced about three p.m., and at half time neither party had gained any advantage. Alter the commencement of play both parties were very resolute, and, after a hard fought struggle, Mr. Ball succeeded in putting the ball through his opponent's goal. The visitors tried bard to obtain a goal but could not succeed, the match ending with one goal in favour of Coleorton to their opponents nothing. Both sides played exceedingly well, and the game at times became very exciting, both parties being repeatedly cheered by the spectators. The following were the players :— Coleorton; W. Rowell (captain), M. T. Ball. S. Robinson, W. Bradford, J. Bird, W. Horne, G. Haywood, T. Williams, J. Williams, W. Fowkes, W. Scattergood, J. Watson, A. Matchett. goal keeper. Ravenstone: J. Collier (captain), S. Collier, F. Worley, John Williamson, J. Marton, T. Marton, W. Biddles, H. Biddles, G. Ellis. T. Wright, W. Baxter, J. Freeman, and O. Holliss, goal keeper. After the match, both parties adjourned to the Beaumont Arms, and a very agreeable evening was spent.

Hinckley News - Saturday 25 December 1880

FOOTBALL - COLEORTON BEAUMONT v GRESLEY UNITED - This match was played at Coleorton on Saturday, and resulted in an easy victory for the home team by five goals to one. For Coleorton the goals were obtained by S. Robinson (3), W. Horne (1) and M.Ball (1). For Gresley by Farmer.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 19 February 1881

Football.—The return match was played on the Coleorton Football Ground, on Saturday (Feb. 12), between the Thringstone and Coleorton teams. The ball was kicked off at four o'clock by T. Winters, the Thringstone captain, and after one hour and a halfs excellent play the game ended with one goal to Thringstone, and Coleorton none. After play, both teams returned to Mr. Charvill's (The Beaumont Arms), where a very pleasant evening was spent with songs, &c.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 26 March 1881

COLEORTON FOOTBALL MATCHES:-

COLEORTON V. OAKTHORPE—This match was played in the presence of a great many spectators, and resulted in the victory of the home team by two goals, well-kicked through by S. Robinson, to one. Both sides played most resolutely.

COLEORTON V. RAVENSTONE—This match was played last week at Ravenstone, and being well-contested, some very good play was witnessed on both sides. The

most conspicuous of the players for Ravenstone were L. Fosbrook (captain), T. Fosbrook, Whetstone, and Kirby. For the visitors, W. Rowell (captain), Ball, Scattergood, Bradford, and Robinson. Up to half-time neither side had any advantage, but on the ball being put in motion again, the visitors holding well together, S. Robinson succeeded in kicking the ball through twice, leaving the visitors victors by two goals to none.

Leicester Daily Mercury - Friday 14 October 1881

SWANNINGTON

Swannington v Coleorton:— The members of the above football clubs played their first match for this season at Swannington. Some good play was shown on both sides, both teams working very friendly together. During the first "half-time" one goal was made from a splendid kick by R Lovitt, the ball being passed through the goal by H Glover. At the call of "half-time" ends were changed, and some very fast play was shown, neither side scoring. At the call of "time" the home side came off victorious by one goal to nil. Both teams adjourned to the "Robin Hood" where all enjoyed themselves.

COLEORTON BEAUMONT v THRINGSTONE ROBIN HOOD - This return association match was played at Coleorton last week, during very unfavourable weather. the home team winning the toss, the visitors kicked off with the wind in their favour. and after a fast and well contested game, the home team won by one goal to nil, which was well kicked through by S. Robinson.

Mr. A. Whyman stood umpire for Coleorton and Mr. James Wardle for Swannington.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 10 December 1881

COLEORTON FOOTBALL — COLEORTON v DERBY HEARTS —This match was played on the Coleorton ground, on Saturday. The weather being all that could be wished for, a large number of spectators were present, and took much interest in the game. The toss falling to the Derby team they chose to play with the wind in their favour. Mr. Ball (captain) kicked off for the home team, after which both sides showed some remarkably good play. Just before half-time was called S. Robinson, with considerable skill, put the ball through the Hearts of Oak goal. On resuming play the ends were changed. and the game became very exciting, as the Derby team seemed determined to retrieve themselves, and were strongly opposed by the Coleortonites, but by continued good play and a determined rush the Derby team scored a goal, thus leaving the match a draw, after one of the fastest games ever played on the Coleorton ground.—After the match the players all retired to Mr. Charville's,

Beaumont Arms Inn, where the visitors were entertained by the home club. After refreshments a most enjoyable evening was spent, songs being sung and toasts given amid much applause. The Derby team returned about 8.30, much delighted with their day's outing.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 28 January 1882

FOOTBALL - COLEORTON v IBSTOCK.—These clubs met for the first time this season on Saturday, on the Coleorton ground. The home team kicked off, and a very fast game commenced. Up to half-time neither side was able to score, although strenuous efforts were made by both teams When ends were changed the ball was forced near the visitors' goal, and was landed between the posts. This put the visitors on their mettle and several vigorous onslaughts were made at the home goal, but were repulsed. The visitors still tried hard to equalise matters but were not able to overcome the strong defence of the Coleorton backs. When time was called the home team were victors by one goal to nil.

Hinckley News - Saturday 06 January 1883

COLEORTON FOOTBALL -

COLEORTON BEAUMONT v HUGGLESCOTE (Robin Hoods) —This match was played on Tuesday, Dec. 26th, on the Coleorton ground, the home team winning the toss. A. Andrews (captain) kicked off for the visitors, and the ball was at once, taken to their opponents' goal, and after a slight scrimmage the ball was kicked through. This put the home team on their mettle, and some very good play ensued. Repeated and good shots were made at the Robin Hoods' goal by Lakin and Heywood, but were well kept out by Collins and the goal keeper. After half time, the home team took possession of the leather, and after a few minutes play the ball was well kicked through by S. Robinson, making matters equal. The ball was again set in motion, and H. Rowell secured another goal for Coleorton. No time was lost, and the ball was again set rolling, when some very fast play took place, each team trying their utmost, but the visitors had again to succumb to the loss of another goal, which was well crossed by Bradford to Richards, who put it through the posts. The game was very fast throughout, and at the call of time Coleorton were victors by three goals to one, thus taking away the reputation of the Robin Hoods, who are called the "A I" team.

COLEORTON v WHITWICK FOREST RANGERS —This match was played at Coleorton on Saturday. Whitwick winning the toss. Coleorton kicked off, and after some very fine play by T. Williams, Platts, Robinson, Platts, the ball was soon put through their opponents' goal. Up to halftime only one goal was secured. The ball was set in motion again, and some very sharp shooting was witnessed by a large number of spectators, but no more goals were obtained. Coleorton players: M. Ball (captain), S. Robinson, T. Williams, R. Platts, T. Thompson, J. Robinson, A. Matchett, J. Glover, J. Potter, T. Williams, J. Glover, G. Platts, and J. Platts. Umpire, G. Walker.

Leicester Chronicle - Saturday 17 November 1894

COLEORTON.

Coleorton Albion v. Coalville East End.— On the Coleorton ground on Saturday. In the first half, the visitors scored once, but the home team soon equalised. The latter had the best of the second half, but the game ended in a draw of one goal each.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 01 November 1884

On Saturday a match was played at Coleorton between the Woodville Star and the Coleorton Football Clubs. The ball was kicked off at four o'clock, and up to half-time no goal had been secured. The ball was kicked off again at half-past past four, and after a well-contested game the home team won by one goal to nil.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 31 January 1885

FOOTBALL - COALVILLE TOWN v COLEORTON. - This match was played at Coalville on Saturday. Play commencing, Coleorton quickly set to work, and after ten minutes play the home team scored the first goal. The ball was placed in the centre again, and when half-time was called the home team stood two goals to none. After half-time, each side tried their utmost to score, and after five minutes play the home team scored again, and one of the home players started the ball, and after twelve minutes play, the home team scored again. This the game ended in a win for the home team five goals to none.

Leicester Journal - Friday 02 December 1887

Ashby Old Boys v Coleorton.—A match between the Ashby Old Boys Club and Coleorton Football Club played on Saturday at Ashby, resulted, after some good play, in a victory fur the home team by two goals to nil.

Ashby-de-la-Zouch Gazette - Saturday 12 November 1887

COLEORTON FOOTBALL MATCH - COLEORTON v BARDON PARK — This match was played at Coleorton on Saturday. The home team kicked off and soon had the ball in the visitors' territory, and though the latter tried hard to reverse this they failed to do so, E. Bell placing the ball to Cuthbert, who kicked the first goal. G. Rowell next put the ball through the posts for the home team, thus making two goals to nil before half time. Resuming play, the home team still had the best of the game, Cuthbert securing two goals in succession, G. Rowell and G. Fowkes taking one each afterwards, thus leaving Coleorton victors by six goals to nil. G. Haywood (captain). G. Fowkes, E Bell, E. Cuthbert, and G. Rowell played remark ably well for the home team. After the match the players and their friends adjourned to the Beaumont Arms, where several of the visitors and players sang some excellent songs, adding much to the enjoyment of the evening.

Leicester Chronicle - Saturday 02 December 1893

FOOTBALL MATCH - A match was played on the club ground on Saturday last between Ravenstone Druids and Coleorton F.C. The Coleorton team played with the wind in the first half, and very soon registered a goal. The Druids soon equalised matters, and before half-time had added another goal to their score. On changing ends, the home team soon pressed, and although Coleorton played well, they could not score. Ravenstone were in good form, and added three more goals to the two scored in the first-half, bringing the toal up to five goals before time was called, thus beating Coleorton by four goals.

Leicester Chronicle - Saturday 10 November 1894

RAVENSTONE

FOOTBALL - A match was played on Saturday between the Ravenstone Rising Star and Coleorton Albion, on the latter's ground. Ravenstone played up well in the first half, and scored two goals, with the wind against them, but Coleorton equalised, the match ending in a draw two goals each.

Coalville Times - Friday 05 February 1897

Coleorton Beaumont Reserves v Whitwick White Cross

A match between the above teams was played on the new ground of the Coleorton club on Saturday, and was witnessed by a good number of spectator, in spite of the inclement weather. The visitors made a rush, and scored in this first two minutes, and though the home team played a stubborn game, half time found Whitwick leading by four goals to none. Soon after the re-start, the home team pressed, and sealed their first goal. Whiwick got a fifth, and both teams scored again before the finish.

Result: Whitwick 6 - Coleorton 2

After the match both teams adjourned to the "Beaumont Arms, where through the kindness of Lady Beaumont, tea had been prepared, and was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone.



Coalville Times - Friday 13 March 1914

Ashby Hastings and Coleorton united were each fined 1s., Coleorton for being late and Ashby for not having the ground ready.

Melton Mowbray Mercury and Oakham and Uppingham News - Thursday 18 December 1913

Thornborough were reported for being late at Coleorton United to the extent of half an hour. The referee decided on 27 minutes play. Thornborough stated that the Coleorton goalkeeper was late also.— The case was adjourned for a further report from the referee.

The Coleorton v. Swannington Institute match was abandoned after a player named Geo. Brooks sustained a fracture of a leg. It was re-arranged for December 20th, on cup-tie terms, at Swannington.

Melton Mowbray Mercury and Oakham and Uppingham News - Thursday 14 January 1915

Ashby Amateurs reported Coleorton United for non-fulfilment of fixture, and claimed 12s. Coleorton were ordered to pay 7s., and the claim for loss of gate was deferred for a month. Coleorton resigned.

Melton Mowbray Mercury and Oakham and Uppingham News - Thursday 11 February 1915

Mr. T. Hopkins, referee, reported that he had not received his fee for a fruitless journey to Coleorton in the match Coleorton v Ashby Hastings. As the former had resigned, It was decided to pay the claim from the League funds.

After the match, Mr. Jackson (Headmaster of Ashby Council School), introduced Mr. Tickner, who congratulated teachers and boys on a sporting, clean game, and then presented the cup to the Breedon School captain.



The Coleorton team has had a very successful season, and apart from winning the shield also won the Breedon Challenge Cup. They won nine matches out of ten and were only beaten once.

The match attracted a large crowd of people.

A SYNOPSIS OF THE CAREER OF GEORGE HAYWOOD

George Haywood, was born on 11 December 1906 in Gelsmoor, Leicestershire (Worthington parish), and was admitted to Worthington National School on 12th June 1911.

He was the only child of Joseph Haywood (b. 15 May 1877), a coal miner, and his wife Lizzie (b. 10 March 1878). By 1927 they were living in Outwood's Lane, Coleorton (actually in Worthington parish), but it is thought they moved there several years prior to this. George worked first as a miner at Coleorton No.3 Colliery (Bug & Wink) and then at New Lount Colliery, where the 1939 register records him as "Colliery Office Timekeeper" and still single, living with his mother and father.

George married Edith Thomas (1908-1953), a school mistress from Blaina, Monmouthshire c.November 1942. George and Edith had three children Carole, David and Kenneth. Edith died at an early age, at which time the family was split up. Carole stayed with her father and David came to live with George's sister Annie Hodges (nee. Haywood) and her husband, known as Joe Harry Hodges, in Stoney Lane, Coleorton. Kenneth went to live with Ted and Hilda (nee. Haywood, George's sister) Hinds in the wooden bungalow which was situated at the Outwood's end of Aqueduct Lane. George and Edith lived at the Outwoods in the cottage just beyond Coleorton Hall bottom lodge but on the opposite side and adjacent to the Rempstone Road. George married for the second time, Audrey Brown in 1956.

George Haywood's footballing career started when from 1924, at the age of 17, to 1927 he played for Coleorton Bible Class Football Club (B.C.F.C) in the Coalville and District Sunday School League as a forward (see *page 17*), and in April 1927, he was selected to represent that league against their Leicester counterparts.

George joined Whitwick Imperial of the Leicestershire Senior League, before the start of the 1927/28 season and only remained with them until April 1928, as he was destined for greater things, and signed for Birmingham Combination club Gresley Rovers. This was a major step up for George, and he scored twice on his debut, in a 4–0 win against Tamworth Castle. His final game with Gresley was against Bournville Athletic at home on the 17th of November 1928 and took his league totals to 11 goals from 20 matches by the end of November.

There followed trials with several English league clubs, including Leicester City and Southend United. However, the pinnacle of his career came following a trial in which he and Gresley team-mate Tommy Robinson played for Birmingham's Combination side, resulting in both signing professional forms for the Football League's first Division club, Birmingham City in January 1929. George was mainly restricted to third team football, but through an injury to Joe Bradford (from Pegg's Green), still as today, Birmingham's all time top goal scorer, George got the opportunity to play in the first team against Manchester City on the 7th of December 1929, and scored twice in a three nil win; quite a debut. He played 38 times for Birmingham from 1928 to 1934 and scored 15 goals in total, including a hat trick against Everton.

By 1934, George featured little and was let go by Birmingham at the end of that season when he joined Chesterfield for the 1934 / 5 season only and scored seven goals in 16 appearances. He went on to play for Cradely Heath, Southport (scored 1 goal in 6 matches), Cradely Heath again, and finally Stafford Rangers, his career coming to an end in 1938.

George Haywood made 60 appearances and scored 23 goals in the English Football League, mainly as a centre forward.

Sadly, George died on the 25th of Janu Hospital, and was buried in Griffydam We wife Edith.	ary 1992 at the age of 85 in Coa sleyan Methodist graveyard with his	lville first
